

Webinar on the Situation in Afghanistan – Implications for the Silk Routes region and what comes next?

Background

The collapse of the national government in Afghanistan in mid-August and subsequent takeover of the country by the Taliban has made all previous scenario building, planning and risk forecasting redundant. The new socio- & geo-political paradigm has prompted the need for a new assessment in order to create a new and adaptive response framework.

If the ongoing humanitarian crisis persists¹ and governance remains weak, then the fallout from Afghanistan might end up severely affecting the migration and displacement situation in the region and beyond. Already there are a large number of internally displaced persons in Afghanistan.² Meanwhile, Pakistan and Iran continue to host the bulk of Afghan refugees,³ while other countries in the region such as Tajikistan have also received thousands of refugees in recent weeks, whereas Turkey remains the primary transit country for irregular Afghan migrants on their way to Europe.

Therefore, it is now critical to support neighbouring countries to anticipate substantial human displacement, and humanitarian challenges, therefore calling for the development of contingency plans accordingly. It is also important for law enforcement agencies to anticipate an increase in illicit activities in the region in relation to migrant smuggling and human trafficking. Reintegration and resettlement programmes would also need to be reviewed and adapted to match the new circumstances on the ground. Community stabilisation via the temporary provision of basic services as well as ensuring sustainable return through livelihood schemes for displaced Afghans might have to be addressed within the region. This might involve the engagement of the new Afghan government by its neighbours to ensure that the socio-economic stability can be restored at the earliest possible and in a sustainable manner.

Purpose

In such a special context, there is a need to inform one another and share a better understanding of the current uncertainty and anticipate the future impact of movements, in terms of migration and displacement. It is also imperative to hear the perspectives of the countries in Afghanistan's immediate neighbourhood. With this in mind, ICMPD's Silk Routes Regional Office is organising a meeting dedicated to the future of migration and displacement dynamics (both internal and external) from Afghanistan and addressing the concerns and the needs of its neighbours. This meeting would thus explore:


- what are the implications for migration management in the neighbourhood based on past experiences of displacement from Afghanistan;
- the challenges and prospects in the short to medium term presentation of country agendas and strategies to tackle expected migratory flows;
